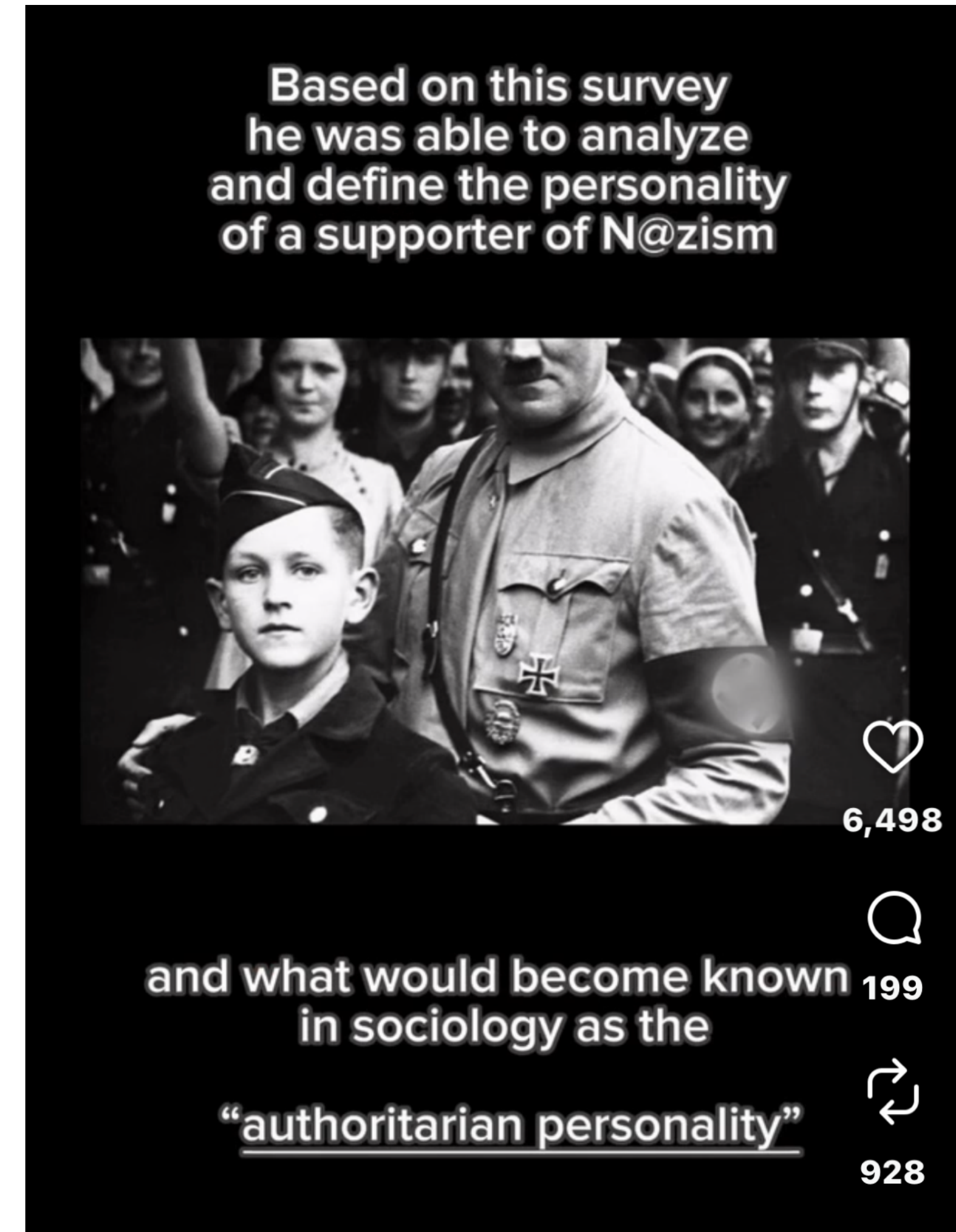


The US is building the machinery of an authoritarian state.

C) Controlling law enforcement

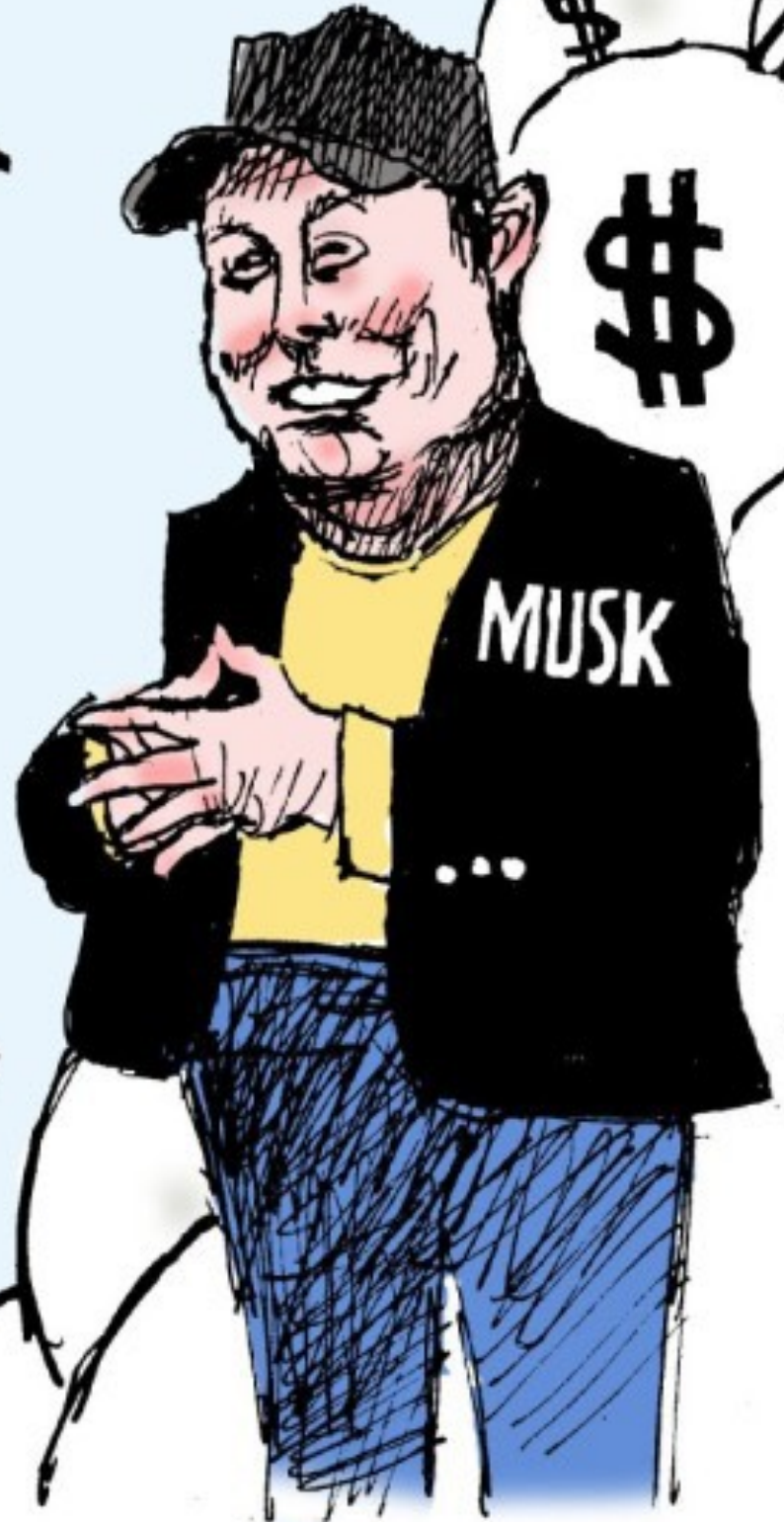
- FBI owned

- US military purged

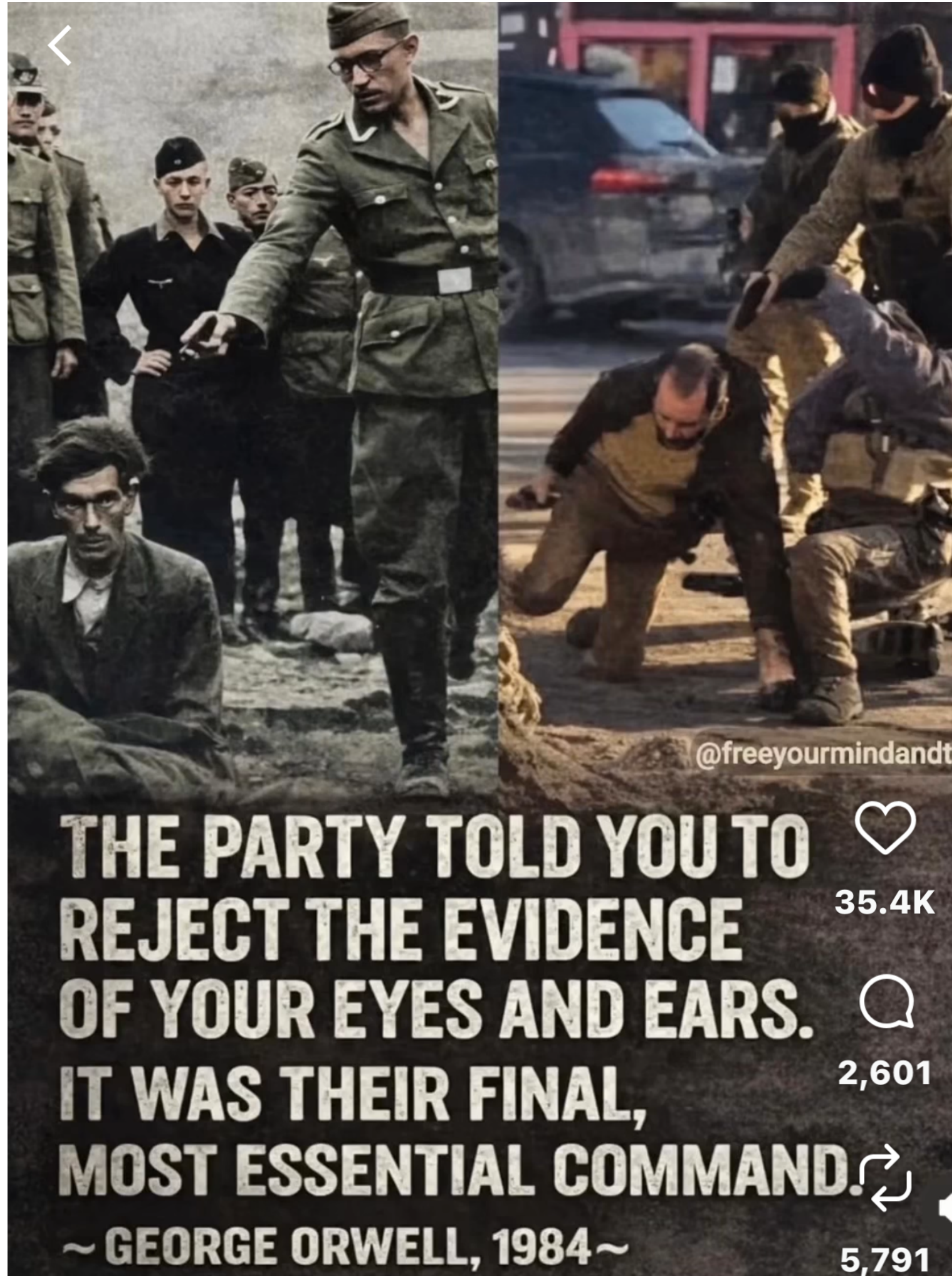
D) Suspending the constitution

Fascist governments suppress their population, then attack their neighbours

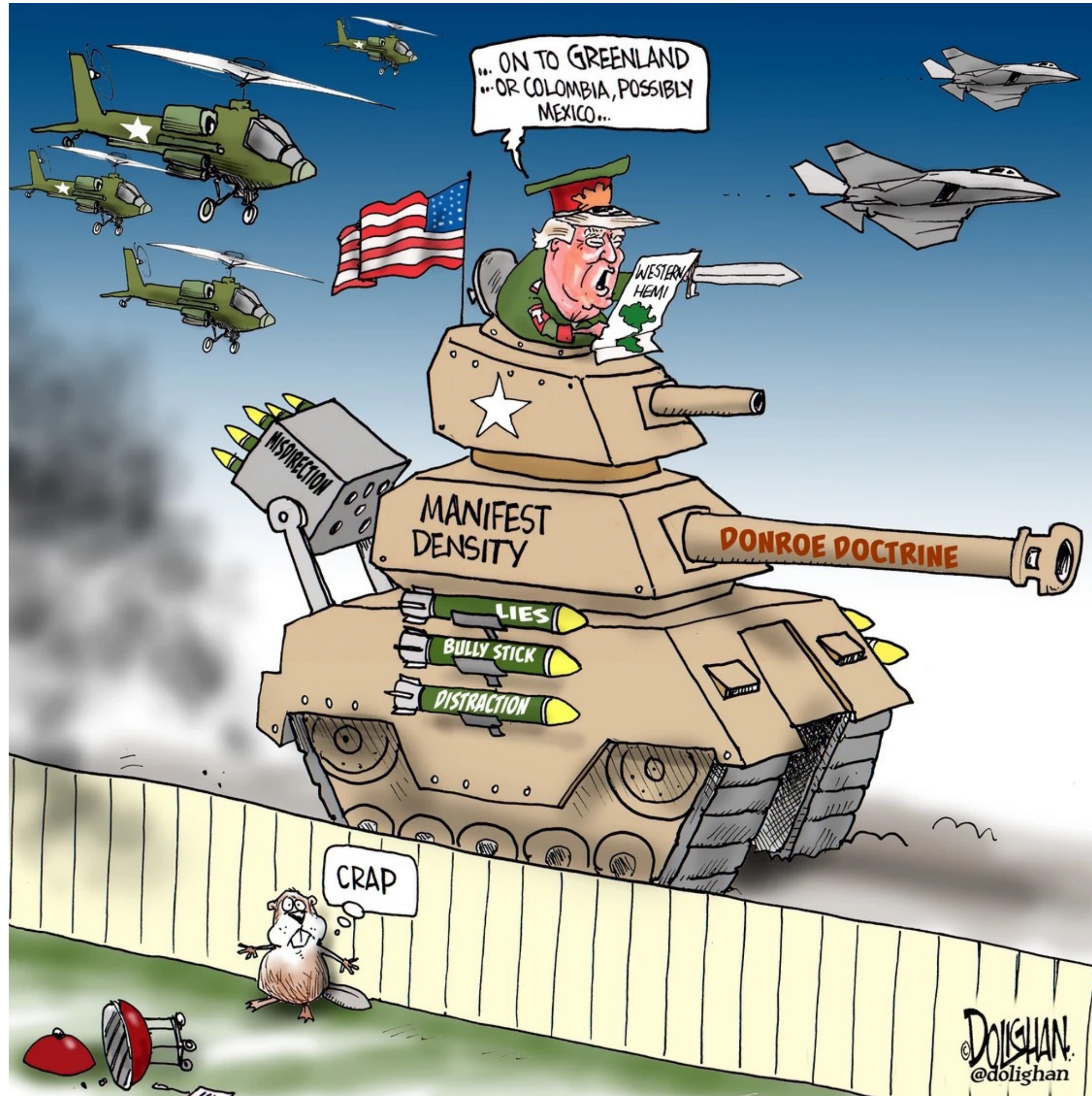


I) Extorting countries by economic means

- Trying to control policies of other nations

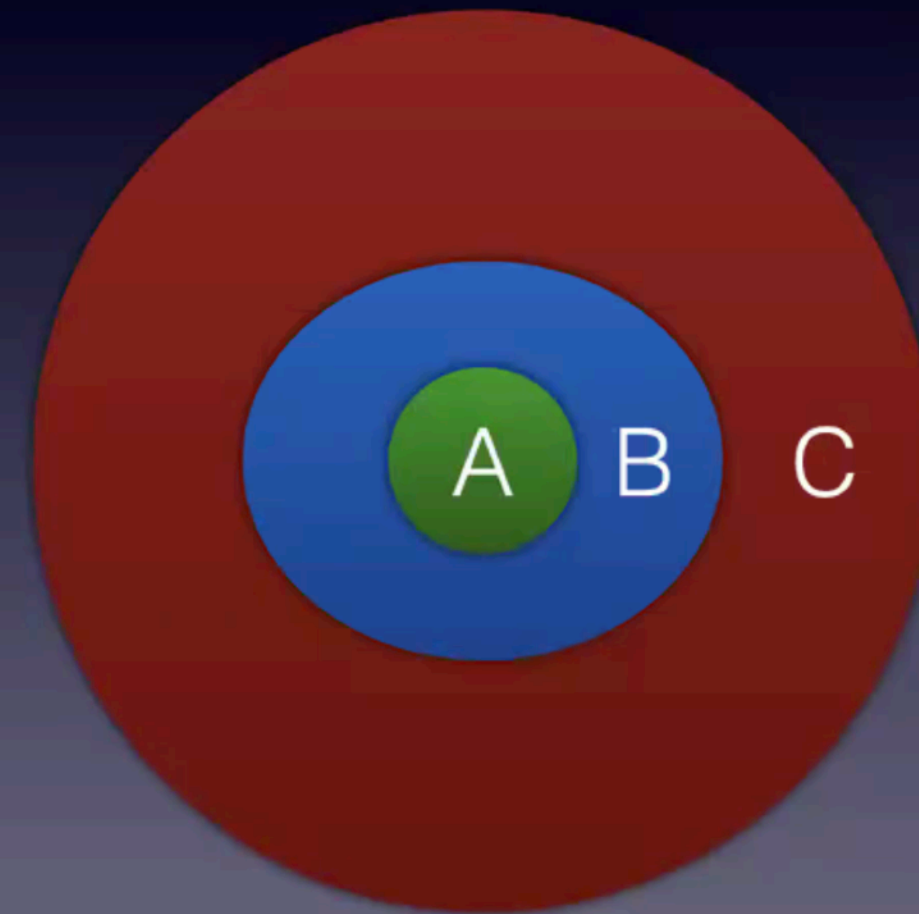
J) Extorting / invading by military means

- Project 2025: domination from Greenland across North & Central America to Venezuela



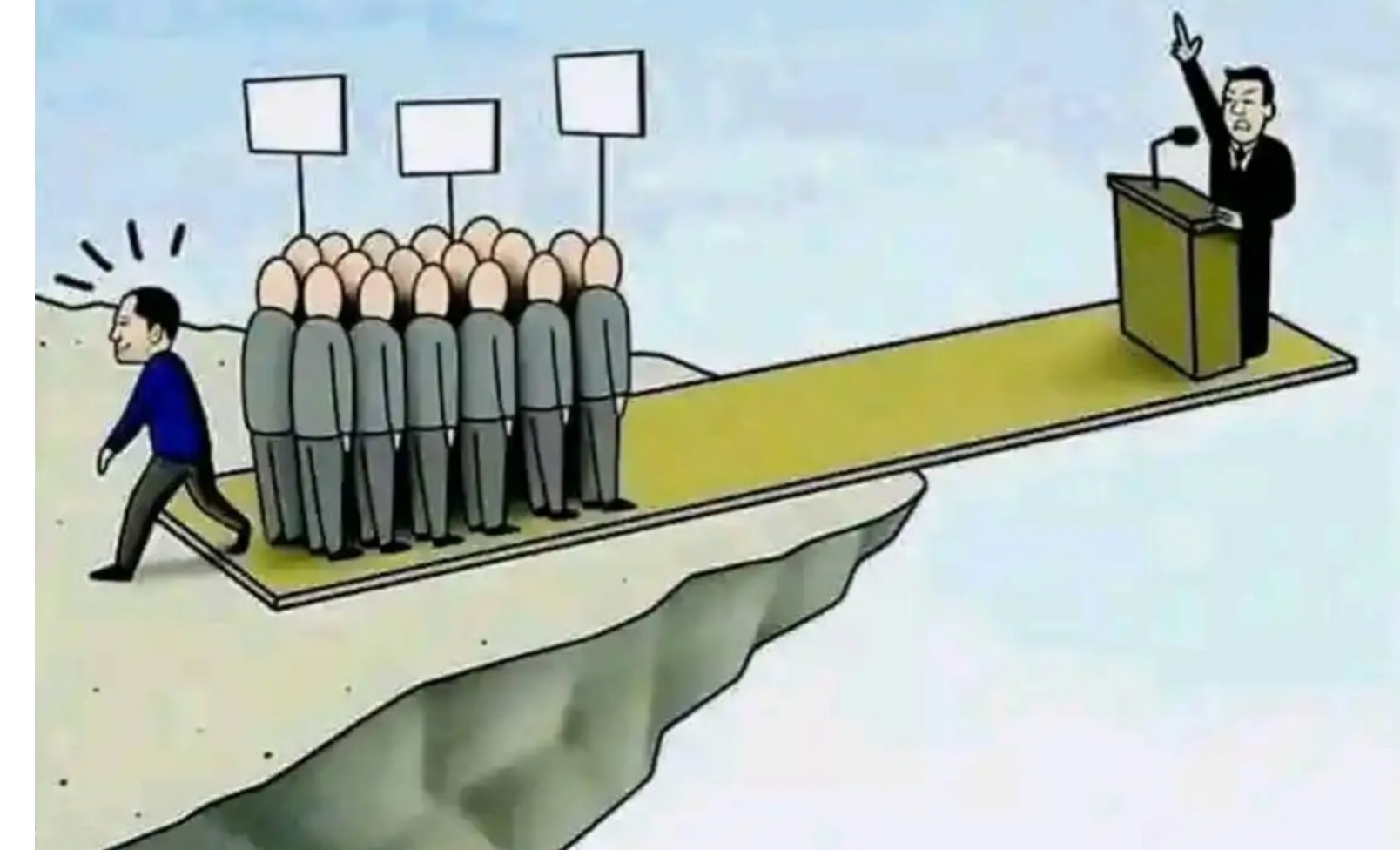
Circles of Influence
